Don't Pass the Buck, Rethink Muck!

Volunteering with an animal welfare organization is very fulfilling and rewarding work. There are so many ways to help, and each organization can have very different programs to be involved in. Typically, at an animal shelter, laundry, dishwashing, and dog walking top the list of ways volunteers support daily operations. There are mountains of dirty blankets and towels and towers of food and water bowls that need to be conquered daily. Dog walking is a very desired "job" that volunteers always look forward to helping with and it is extremely important. Most shelters have small kennels, some with outdoor access, some without, and dogs are typically housed independently. Every dog is an individual and copes with these conditions differently. Kennel deterioration is a very big concern, so it is very important to get the dogs out of their kennels for playgroups and walks, ideally multiple times a day.

At Hallie Hill, we are unique, and our needs are a bit different. We don't have the mounds of laundry and piles of dishes. Our dogs are in large, grassy enclosures, mostly two to an enclosure. Our dogs have room to run, places to dig, bask in the sun or nap in the shade. They can play with their pen mate if they choose to do so, all within their living space. So, because of our unique setting, walking our dogs is not the dire need that it is at a shelter. One of our top needs at the sanctuary is to keep our animals' environments clean. "Mucking," more commonly known as pooper scooping, is one of our needed volunteer tasks. Sure, it's not glamorous, but it's necessary and it really is the biggest opportunity to be



out with the dogs, learning who they are, getting to really know their individual personalities and getting hands on time with many dogs during one volunteer shift. We have a small staff at the sanctuary and with over two hundred animals, we rely on our volunteers to help with monitoring the dogs and to report behavior changes or health concerns to us.

Signing up for a mucking shift is really what you make of it. It's a three-hour window that volunteers can utilize as they wish. Of course, the mucking needs to get done and honestly, it's very satisfying making things clean for the dogs! Entering a pen and doing the mucking is a good time for the dogs to acclimate having someone in with them, it allows them to get over their initial excitement and calm down. Then, once you are finished, you can interact with the dogs who choose to do so. You can play with toys or throw a ball for them, you can speak gently to the shy dogs to make them feel more comfortable, we have brushes available so you can groom those that like to be handled. The dogs whose pens back up to play yards can be brought out into the play yard for "sniffaris", which is always fun! With the warmer weather we will have our sensory wagons to bring into enclosures for the dogs to sniff and the swimming pools for the pups to splash in! Mucking shifts are valuable socialization time with the dogs that is priceless. As you can see, there is so much more to signing up for a mucking shift than what the title says! So, "Don't Pass the Buck, Sign Up to Muck!"

Retractable leashes are not only difficult to control, but they can also be dangerous to you and your pet—even for well-trained dogs on their best behavior. Below are some of the dangers of these popular leashes:

The jerking stop of the leash can cause injuries to the pet. Once the leash has run out of cord, or the human hits the stop button on the handle, it results in a sudden jerk that can cause neck wounds, lacerations to the trachea, and injuries to the spine.

The cord can cut, burn, or even amputate the walker. If the human gets tangled in the cord or grabs it while it is retracting or reeling out, serious injuries can occur.

Retractable leashes don't offer enough control. If your pup is 15 to 20 feet away from you and an unfriendly dog approaches, it's extremely difficult to pull them back to safety. In the few seconds it takes to reel in your pup, both dogs could be facing serious injury if a quick-moving fight occurs. Dogs can also easily dart into traffic or eat something toxic while walking far ahead.

The leash handle is bulky. This allows the handle to easily be pulled out of the human's hand easily. It can cause injury to the pet if it hits them, and the loud sound could alarm them, causing them to run away.

Cords can easily break, tear, or fray. If the pet on the other end is powerful and takes off running full speed, the cord can snap. This may injure the human walking them as the cord comes snapping back toward their body and face. Also, the constant retracting of the cord can cause it to rub on the handle, creating frays that can eventually tear with little force or tension.

The leashes can be a tripping hazard. The cord can easily get tangled around the human's feet, and it can pile up if your pet suddenly stops while the cord is completely extended.

Retractable leashes can encourage bad walking habits in your dog. These leashes can teach dogs to keep their distance from their human on walks. And, because the retractable leash never slackens, it encourages them to pull.




